UPDATE FROM THE CHAIR

Kia ora this is the second of our quarterly Ngāti Mutunga o Wharekauri Iwi Trust Pānui. I'm really excited about where we are heading. If you haven't already been alerted to our new website by your whānaunga, then check out www.nmow.co.nz (also see back page). This is a great addition to our communications. Keep an eye on it regularly as it will be one of the first places we update our Iwi Trust, Whānau and Iwi notices. And don't forget to send any contributions you want to make to our office. We'll make sure they get in to the quarterly pānui.

So, we've had our elections. We had a very good voter turnout at least by past standards. We had the largest number of people vote in the elections since the Iwi Trust began back in 2004. I'd really like to welcome back Robin Page and Deborah Goomes. I'd also like to welcome on-board from Te Ika-a-Maui, Jamie Tuuta. Jamie is already utilising his extensive iwi governance and management background to great effect in the Trust. I'm particularly happy at the number of our whānau who put their hand up to be considered for the positions. It is a pleasing testament to all of our commitment to Ngāti Mutunga o Wharekauri that so many took such an active interest. Thank you all so much.

That election was conducted through an independent electoral organisation for the first time. The positive feedback was overwhelming. I have not received one complaint about how the election was run. Clarity and transparency of process underpins everything we are

trying to achieve this year (and in the final quarter of last year).

The increased transparency the Iwi Trust is endeavouring to achieve was highlighted in the last quarter, by the production and posting of our Annual Report and Pānui to you all. Thank you for the positive feedback we received regarding the first mail out of an annual report by the Trust. I can't say strongly enough how important regular and open communication is for all of us whether working on the Iwi Trust or being members of it.

That was never more so than in the decision by Trustees to run the AGM across three hui to enable as many of our people as possible to make their views and thoughts known to us. These were robust and ultimately successful hui. And yes we took home some clear messages about the need to really focus on our distributions policy and to keep improving our communications.

There was a lot of discussion around the distributions policy. In particular, our whānau raised some questions about why the Iwi Trust was considering a policy that was applied in different ways dependent on whether you were resident in Wharekauri or Aotearoa. I can assure you that kaupapa will come back to our table for more Trustee kōrero. And yes, we do want to engage in more kōrero with you as we develop this very important take over the next two years.

→ structure to ensure it has the specialist capacity that is required to implement the planned strategic direction. The work of Ward Kamo and Andrew Harrison who joined us back in July has been excellent in this respect. It's great to be around smart, proactive and creative individuals who possess such good management skills.

They've helped us ensure there is effective allocation of responsibilities and no duplication of effort. We've developed a plan to ensure overheads are reduced to allow greater asset reinvestment now and beneficiary distributions later. This has resulted in the proposal to:

- Centralise all commercial activities under the Asset Holding Company (AHC)
- Increase the size of the AHC Board and carry out an election for the entire Board
- Split executive responsibilities between Trust and AHC and contract specialist support for functions such as communications and finance.

In this upcoming quarter the Trustees are going to focus on finalising our structure by:

- Asking for nominations and holding elections for AHC Board
- Advertising for our Trust Administrator
- Advertising for a new Iwi Trust Board Secretary
- Appointing a chartered accounting firm to provide accounting and administration services.

One thing I really want to make clear is that our office is going nowhere. We are proud that our office is our central focal point for Ngāti Mutunga initiatives on the island. So it's not going anywhere and it will be staffed by at least one on-island person. On that note, you will see in this pānui that we are advertising for the two office positions and the AHC directors. I encourage those who believe they have the necessary skills and experience to put your names forward.

At our AGM we stated our determination to reduce our costs to \$325,000 for overheads in the 2010 / 2011 financial year. I can assure you we are committed to this. The restructuring process is our first step in achieving this very significant milestone.

Lastly on a very positive note, we will be launching the first component of the distribution policy we outlined to you – and the one most of us indicated strong support for. Our Pūtea Whanāungatanga, with a total budget of \$50,000 will be launched during the quarter beginning 1 April 2010.

The main purpose of this fund is to:

- Build the cultural knowledge and participation of Ngāti Mutunga o Wharekauri
- Encourage and grow the cultural practices of Ngāti Mutunga o Wharekauri
- Encourage cultural leadership of Ngāti Mutunga o Wharekauri.

We'll let you know as soon as it goes live.

Well whānau, I said last time things were moving. We know where we want to go as an Iwi Trust for the benefit of all our whānau. We know we have a lot of hard work before us, and reaching our goals will not be easy. There will always be some who will seek to criticise and undermine our efforts to get transparency, cost reductions and increased distribution to the whānau. Kei te pai! It is because of the overwhelming number of you who have given us positive feedback on our general direction, held us accountable in positive and constructive ways (even if our collective ears still hurt from being pulled), and told us to 'kia kaha', that we find the resolve to forge ahead. Thank you to you all.

Keep in touch all, and I'll do likewise.

ADVANCE NOTICE - PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE TRUST DEED

Kiaora te whānau.

As a result of the consultation rounds in 2009, and the clear message received by beneficiaries, trustees will consider a special resolution at their February hui to reduce trustee numbers from nine to seven. This will impact the total number of Wharekauri based positions. The North and South Island based positions will not be affected by this proposal.

The proposed changes stem in the first instance, from The Wynn Williams report which recommended (amongst many things) that: 'The number of trustees be reduced to five, three of which are ahi kaa, one of which is Te Waipounamu trustee and one of which is a Te Ika a Maui trustee'.

Subsequent to the report, the trustees engaged in a series of consultation Hui with beneficiaries in both Wharekauri and New Zealand. The consensus arising from those Hui was reducing trustees to five may be too big a jump. There was certainly a greater appetite for a reduction to seven.

Other Trust Deed changes proposed in the original audit report will not be actioned at this time.

Should the special resolution to reduced trustee numbers to seven be passed, the Trust Deed will go out to beneficiaries for postal vote.

PĀ TANGAROA MoU SIGNED IN CHATHAM ISLANDS

An agreement signed on 25 November between the Ministry of Fisheries and Chatham Islands imi / iwi opens the door to more collaborative fisheries management for the region.

The Pā Tangaroa Regional Fisheries Forum acts for Moriōri and Ngāti Mutunga. Forum Co-chair Shirley King (Moriōri), Trudee Thomas (on behalf of Ngāti Mutunga), and Ministry of Fisheries chief executive Wayne McNee signed the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), formally marking the start of a mutually beneficial working-relationship.

Establishing this MoU formalises the relationship the Forum and Ministry have developed over the past four years. It creates the basis for an enduring constructive relationship that will further the interests of both parties. The focus of the agreement is to ensure fisheries resources in the region are used in a manner that provides greatest overall economic, social and cultural benefit; the agreement also recognises and provides for the use and management practices of tchakat henu / tangata whenua in respect to their fisheries resources.

The Forum provides a sound platform for iwi to move beyond managing local impacts on their fishing-grounds, to become part of the decision-making around wider management issues.

Shirley King, at the signing ceremony, gave credit to Ministry officials who had worked with the Forum to develop the MoU. But she gave particular credit to the imi / iwi at the Chathams Islands. Their willingness to work and come together for a common purpose that will benefit all those involved in fishing at the Chatham Islands – customary, recreational and commercial – was acknowledged.

The Forum has also adopted a project plan to provide a framework for the work of the Forum. The Forum has already decided to move the management of their customary fisheries under the kaimoana fishing regulations by nominating Tchakat Kitaki/Tangata Kaitiaki to issue authorisations within their management areas for customary use.

TRIBUTE TO TRUDEE THOMAS

Trudee Thomas started working for Ngāti Mutunga o Wharekauri Iwi Trust in December of 2004. Previous to this her career in the fishing industry advanced from factory hand to Factory Manager then Technical Advisor for the Sanfords Deepwater Fleet.

The latter role involved at-sea audits, fisheries catch reporting and crew training and proved to be an excellent foundation for the expertise she would later go onto to provide for the Iwi Trust.

In 2004 Trudee was first employed to be the Trust Secretary, a role that was home based and was responsible for the co ordination of board meetings, annual work plans, elections and general office administration.

Before too long the role expanded to incorporate fisheries administration, staff management, helping the organisation gain MIO status and supporting the leasing of ACE.


Running the remote office for the iwi has meant that Trudee needed to have initiative and personal discipline. The role also required her to work with people from all walks of life with sometimes very differing points of view.

In April Trudee leaves her job at the Trust to pursue her studies and further advance her business management skills. Trudee was a good way through a Diploma in Business Studies when she returned to the Chatham Islands however the demands of the job with the iwi meant that she had to give up her studies. This year she plans to complete her course and advance to a Bachelor of Business Studies.

We wish Trudee all the best in her future endeavours and take this opportunity to say thank you for all her hard work.

AN UPDATE OF OUR ASSETS

With only 3 months of the financial year still to go the Net Surplus from business activities in the current year is expected to be approximately \$200,000 less than last year's result. This is largely due to:

- Lower Deepwater ACE returns due to Orange Roughy TACC cuts
- Pāua returns are significantly reduced in the current fishing season due to the high NZD and the reduced demand from Asia
- Investment income has almost reduced by half from last financial year largely due to the low interest rates environment in New Zealand (resulting from the financial crisis).

Activities over the last Quarter

The focus over the last 3 months has been leasing the Quota for the fishing season that starts 1 October each year.

Wetfish ACE has been leased to a number of parties under a competitive process. Market wet fish ACE prices were clearly down on the previous season predominantly due to a combination of a high NZD and a 16% cut in the Orange Roughy TACC, which comprises over a third of the value of the wet fish parcel. This was partially mitigated by breaking off some smaller parcels and leasing them directly to specialist operators.

Both blue cod and kina were allocated to Iwi fishers in accordance with the allocation policy and previous seasons and on the same terms to all successful applicants.

The market for pāua internationally has been depressed, the NZ dollar is high and going into the new season both New Zealand canneries were holding significant amounts of stock. Hence the decision was made to lease 1/3 of the ACE during the last quarter and wait until the 2010 calendar year to lock in the remainder. Although it is impossible to predict the market and exchange rate, it is not expected to worsen hence the rationale to only lock in 5t in 2009. Pāua will be fished by Iwi fishers in accordance with the allocation policy and on the same terms to all successful applicants.

The Land & Buildings the Iwi Trust own comprise; the Office building and land; the Sandstone house; and land that is targeted for marae development. During the last quarter the Sandstone house was rented at market rates after being

advertised locally.

Cash investments continue to be rolled over for a 90 day or less term and with AA rated entities (ASB, BNZ and UDC). Investments over the quarter have increased from \$3.7m to \$4.1m.

Canterbury Mortgage Trust (CMT) repaid a further 5% during December bringing the total repayment to date to 65%. CMT hope to make a further repayment of 5% before July 2010. CMT also issued their annual report for the year ended 31 March 2009 during the last quarter in which they made what they termed a 'conservative loss provision' of 12%. However the Iwi Trust had already pre-empted this in their financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2009 by making a provision for a loss of 15%. Hence the Iwi Trust does not expect to have to provide for any additional loss this financial year.

As you are aware the Trustees have undertaken a review of the organisation structure and capacity required to implement the Trust's planned strategic direction. There are some changes that impact on the commercial entities. Moving forward AHC will be responsible for the management of all the commercial activities of the Trust (currently MFL is responsible for the leasing of ACE and the Trust directly manages approximately 50% of the investments). This will result in efficiency gains and clarity of responsibilities. Given the significant changes to the role of AHC the Trustees are proposing to increase the size of the board and to undertake an election for the entire AHC Board in March.

Lastly the Iwi Trust, along with Hokeitahi Moriori Trust has played an instrumental role in encouraging greater co-operation within the fishing industry that can allow the Chatham Islands to exercise greater control over its own resources. The Chatham Island Fishing Project (outlined below) is the first step along this pathway.

Activities planned over the next quarter

Quota – Lease Cray ACE for the fishing season beginning 1 April 2010 and lease the remaining two thirds of the Pāua ACE.

Chatham Island Fishing Project – Participate in and progress this project to collectively agreed recommendations.

Investment Policy – Finalise review of the investment policy and re-structure cash investments to align with this policy.

Director Appointments – Electing a board of five directors to the Asset Holding Company.

Chatham Island Fishing Project

Chatham Island Quota Holdings Limited ("CIQH"), Hokotehi Moriori Trust ("HMT"), Ngāti Mutunga o Wharekauri Iwi Trust ("NMoIT"), Waitangi Seafoods Limited ("WSL") and Aotearoa Fisheries Limited ("AFL") are pleased to announce that they have agreed to a project to collectively investigate the feasibility of adding value to the Chatham Island fishing industry through increased co-operation.

The project will focus on investigating areas where there is immediate potential to enhance returns for quota owners, processors and Chatham Island fishers, and in particular will consider; options for enhancing the management of the respective quota holdings through co-operation; arrangements that can better co-ordinate and align the supply chains for Blue Cod and Kina; and the potential for adding value to other under-developed Chatham Island fisheries.

A project committee has been appointed to oversee the project, comprising of representation from all those involved. It is expected the project will be completed before the end of May allowing any recommendations to be implemented for the fishing season beginning 1 October 2010. The project will involve discussion and meetings with industry stakeholders, in particular fishers, so that all views are received.

This project is a first small step but all the parties consider it crucial if the full potential of the Chatham Island fishing industry and wider economy is to be achieved. Further updates will be provided as the project is progressed.

AHC DIRECTOR ELECTIONS

The Trustees will be appointing directors to the Ngāti Mutunga o Wharekauri Iwi Trust Asset Holding Company Board in March. The Trustees are looking for individuals who have two or more of the following:

- Governance or senior executive experience in organisations with \$20m plus of assets
- Strong general investment and commercial acumen and experience
- Knowledge and experience in the Chatham Island fishing industry and wider economy
- Understanding of Ngāti Mutunga tikanga, the wider Chatham Island community and the Māori Fisheries settlement.

HONOURING OUR TIPUNA

Mary Kamo has a possible answer to the photo of the beautiful mystery woman (pictured above) wearing the moko in the last pānui: Hana-Peti Kamo (nee Dix).

Charles (Tom) Kamo, when he was living with our family spoke to me at times about his early life, especially of his growing up on the Chathams.

He was brought up, in the main, by Grandmother, Hana-Peti Kamo.

He talked of a Mrs. Thompson who, he said, wore a moko. He said that she was the wife of a Minister.

Charles was born in Plimmerton. The son of Jack Kamo and Charlotte Rangihaeata.

When he was about three years old, Mrs Thompson came to Plimmerton, collected him and took him to the Chathams. He had a vague recollection of the moko that she wore, and the boat on which they travelled.

His Grandmother later told him that she had asked Mrs Thompson to bring him away from Plimmerton because she had heard that he was not being well treated there.
